



Learning Stories

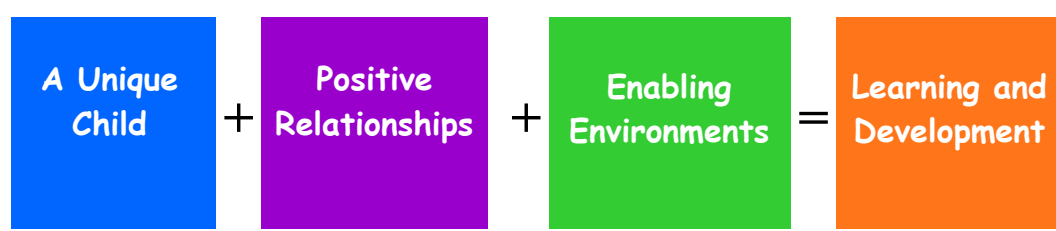


A learning story not only tells a story of what a child is learning about but how a child is learning.

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To ensure children are learning and developing their skills, understanding attitudes and knowledge, we need to observe them during their play.

As we observe, we look, listen and note their interests and individual learning needs.

It is important that practitioners and parents/carers share any information of observed interests with each other. This enables the key person to support children in their learning and development by planning environments and activities using the appropriate resources for these interests.



Your child's key person will observe your child and produce a learning story using photographs of what they are doing and of the different stages of the activity along with any talk used by or responded to by your child.

It will show you their current interests and how they are learning through play. It will tell you what we will plan and provide for the next steps of learning to develop their skills, understanding and knowledge, and any activities you may be able to do at home to support their learning.

There will also be a space for you to add any comments—what your child likes to do, has done as a result of the learning story, or any new interests they may have.
